5 Easy Pieces for Student Engagement



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SUMMARY

As a long-time teacher, I picked up the book Inclusive Teaching: Strategies for Promoting Equity in the College Classroom, by Hogan and Sathy, with a skeptic's scowl. Soon I was fully converted and hadn't finished the first chapter before I was applying their tips.

I promise you that any of these five easy pieces will generate some sort of ripple in classroom engagement, and that all of them working together will fundamentally improve discussions. To be most effective, the pieces must be applied consistently over time; every class, if possible.

3. TODAY'S OBJECTIVES


As they sound, a slide presented early in class and crafted to sound reasonably interesting. 1 minute.

At the start of every class – first thing and without fail so they can count on it - I'll pose a slide with a 'fun' set of question unrelated to class topics.

Frankly, some of them bomb; no one feels like answering.

Undeterred, I'll revise or toss out that set and try something else next time. 2-3 minutes.

1. WARM UP

- I slept great last <u>night</u>, I think it's because ...
- This may be obvious to everyone else, but I have a question about ...

- What is your oldest or most cherished grudge?
- It seems to me, the toughest part of this class will be ...

2. RECAP LAST CLASS

Pose for discussion a slide with 3 questions recapping the last class. Don't get clever - give them an easy one they'll be confident in answering. 2-3 minutes.

- What role does the federal government play in community development spending? Is it direct?
- How does fed money flow down to the state? Who's a big CD player in Indiana?
- Name a difference between these theories: technical Assistance, ABCD and social fields.

4. THINK • PAIR • SHARE

Think-pair-share is a simple technique that keeps your most outspoken students from taking over the conversations and guarantees some level of participation from every person.

Students first answer a prompt on their own by writing down their answers, then come together in pairs or small groups. Then they share their conclusions with the class. Give them 2-3 minutes.

Discussing an answer first with a partner before sharing maximizes participation and helps to focus attention on the prompts.

1:54 Confer with your team.

5. BIG TAKE•AWAYS

These are grand, sweeping statements about the subject matter that capture the tone and context for the day's discussion. Keep them simple – and catchy.
